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And they managed just 22 net yards on the ground.

"You can't turn the ball over that many times and generate any offense," Moshimer said. "It puts too much pressure on the defense."

"The defense played well at first, but were worn out at the end. It was discouraging. Our offense wasn't mentally ready — there was no execution."

The Rocks, now 0-2 in the WLAA and 1-3 overall, had to play the game without star split end Craig Morton, who hurt his shoulder in last week's disappointing loss to Livonia Bentley. But Moshimer was pleased with the play of Storm, who did a fine job in relief of Sobditch. The 5-foot-11 jun-

ior hit on 7 of 15 passes for 129 yards and one touchdown.

"I WAS PROUD of Storm," Moshimer said. "He came in under a difficult situation. He hasn't practiced much. He came in cold and did a heckuva job."

Sobditch may have lost his starting quarterback position to Storm, but he played an outstanding game on defense. He made two touchdown-saving interceptions in the end zone that kept the Rocks in the game in the second half.

For Salem, things don't get any easier. The Rocks meet Stevenson (1-1, 3-1) next week.

"We'll just have to get tougher," Moshimer said.

## Hills runner grabs national masters title

Dave Emery, 45, of Farmington Hills took first place in the master's division of the prestigious Dayton River Corridor Classic half-marathon Sept. 23.

The Ford Motor Co. engineer won the 45-49 age division running the 13-mile course in a time of 1:15.0.

The Dayton River Classic, a TAC national championship race, earned international recognition in 1983 when Paul

Cummings set the world half-marathon record in 1:01.31.

Thus, the Dayton race has earned the title, "World's fastest half-marathon."

By winning the master's division, Emery is crowned the TAC master's champion.

Another area runner, John Grabowski of Orchard Lake, placed ninth overall with a 1:09.0 clocking.

## Hawks outleg Churchill, at last

For the first time in the history of Farmington Harrison boys cross country, the Hawks have bested Livonia Churchill.

They did it Thursday at Cass Benton, 24-31.

"The kids did a fantastic job," said Harrison coach John Schumacher. "They knew what they had to do, and they did it."

Dave Linn led the upset by nipping Churchill's Pete Mills at the wire. Linn cut the tape at 17:23, Mills at 17:27.

The Hawks got vital support from Chris Hart, third with a 17:34, and from Mike Esker, fourth with a 17:38. Tom Blison placed sixth with a 17:53 and Bill Warburton 10th (18:19).

The victory pushes the Hawks' record to 4-4.

The Harrison girls, despite a nice run by Lauri Runk, lost to Churchill, 24-35.

Runk won the meet with a 26:02 time. Churchill, however, captured sec-

ond, third, fifth, sixth and seventh places.

Jenny Anderson (21:58) placed fourth and Andrea Pascol (22:57) eighth for the Hawks (3-5).

THE FARMINGTON boys cross country team, ranked No. 2 in Oberlin and No. 9 in the state coaches poll, won its sixth straight dual meet of the season Thursday night against Plymouth Salem, 15-48, at Cass Benton.

The Falcons won it in typical fashion, they took the first six places, all six finishing within 38 seconds of each other.

"Farmington," said Salem coach Tom Trudale, "is just awesome this year. That's really all you can say."

Chris Inch took first with a 16:29 clocking. Al Stebbins was second (18:40). Bruce Kratt (16:59), Bryan Lawton (17:02), Dave Dunneback (17:03) and Bruce Kerr (17:07) followed

for Farmington despite the loss.

Salem got a third from Amy Miyazaki (21:38), a sixth from Brenda Boyd (22:12) and a seventh from Erica Bashor (23:01).

Salem is 3-1 overall, Farmington now 2-4.
