Funding should have started five years ago. Sever said. The toty, he be-lieves, could accomplish the capital im-provements, but now the public lacks confidence in the council. In any budget year, Sever suggested, council could set aside surplus revenue and earmark it for capital improve-ments.

Another financing option, offered by Sever, includes allocating money in the city's annual budget to begin develop-try's annual budget to begin develop-refers building a new facility in plas-es and paid for on an 'asyou go' basis. said council had not taken the time to determine if it is cheaper to build in phases rather than paying interest on bonds. At that time Sever said the police fa-cility should be completed in three phases. The size of the facility could then be doubled with a smaller finan-cial commitment clal

As another financing method, Sever suggested the development of a plan that "would result in additional funding

from projected new development. All of the planned new development, for example, along 12 Mile Road, should pay a percentage of needed improve-ments along the thoroughlare. Sever did not suggest how that percentage would be determined. In addition, Sever believes all new development in Farmington Hills should help pay for needed drains and sewers in the city. This would apply re-gardless of where the development is located within the city, he said.

ANOTHER OPTION would be to determine if there is a "viable way" that applicants approved for Economic Development Corp. (Inancing could be-come contributors to the capital imcome contributors to the capital im-provements plan. "It would be fair for them to assume some of the responsibility in the com-munity for improvements," Sever said.

"I do not feel the residents and homeowners should be paying a portion of improvements because new develop-ment is coming into the city," he con-

ment is coming into the city." he con-tinued. In August, Sever said that while op-posed to a charter amendment, he capital improvements under certain or and aupport a special millage for conditions. "I would support a special millage for capital improvements but less than i.5 mills with a time period." he said, prior to the August primary. Parailelling his views on the pro-mprovements plan, Sever believes more community input is needed. What is needed is a citizens task force to review the capital improve-ments plan and determine which are the most immediately needed projects.

"I am very much interested in in-volving more people in the communi-ty," Sever said.

ONE OF HIS CRITICISMS of the council is that the same people are al-ways involved in commissions and ad hoc and standing committees, Sever said

hoc and standing committees, Sever said. "The city is too selective in their in-volvement," he said. "They settle into a stagnant state. They involve the same people ail the time." "We need new blood, new ideas," Sever continued. "To be on a commit-tee, you don't need to be an expert." Instead, a person should have inter-est in serving on a committee or com-mission and. "want to be a part of a growing community." If elected, Sever believes he would "do what has't been done in a long time" - sell ideas.

Into the continuous to sen programs and ideas, such as capital improve-ments. "I would go out and sell the ideas. If I can't sell the poople, then maybe I am wrong (about a particular idea or pro-gram)," Sever said. Flanning to vote for the passage of the Voter's Choice Amendment, Sever said he is "not trightened by what it would mean to the city. I don't see it as a catastrophe to the city." What Proposal C would do is put a restriction on leadership, Sever said. The quality of leadership will then have to improve so the iteration sed. "Why shouldn't people who live here be sold on their community." Sever said. "Give people the opportunity to make those decisions (about taxes, for example)."

ON ANOTHER front, Sever sup-ports allowing the Farmington Com-nunly Library system to become inde-pendent. It would be able to levy its own operating millinge. The library's independence, Sever said, would relieve the "personality in-fluence the conneit has on the current library." Independence would also free up money in the city's budget that is now allocated for the library, he added.
