

Paint your noggin'

Expert sends along some simple instructions to follow for Halloween makeup

Even a man who is pure of heart and says his prayers at night can become a wolf when the moon is full.

That was the classic warning Maria Ouspenskaya, playing an old gypsy, gave to Lon Chaney Jr. who was portraying the title character in the old horror film "The Wolf Man."

But the gypsy's words of wisdom were wrong in one respect.

Forget about the full moon. All it takes to make the transformation for Halloween is some crepe hair, latex, and black, brown and red grease pencils, according to Donna Pachota, one

of the owners of the Gags and Games costume shop in Livonia.

The latex is applied to the skin, then covered with the "hair" to the owner's own taste in shagginess. Red grease pencil under the eyes provides an appropriate bloodshot appearance.

THE WEREWOLF is just one of the costumes that Pachota predicted would be in fashion this Halloween.

"The werewolf is tops. That's the most popular," she said. "Next would be the built-up types, a Frankenstein or a spaceman with a large head. Witches and vampires are always popular. Southern belles, and all the sexy cos-

tumes. Playboy bunnies and regular bunnies."

The punk look, with lots of glitter, is in again this year, she said. So are the Michael Jackson and Boy George looks.

PACHOTA ALSO had further tips for people interested in applying their own makeup — or in making up their children.

Pachota recommends using water-based or cream makeup on a child. These makeup don't have the staying power of grease makeup, but that just makes cleanup all the easier when trick or treating is over.

If you do use grease paint, the first step in getting a clown face is to spread cold cream, then clown white over the child's whole face. Outline in black grease pencil the areas you want highlighted: a broad clown's mouth, rosy cheeks, thick eyebrows.

Push some of the white off the highlighted areas, then color them in with a grease pencil of the desired color. Finally, brush on some translucent powder to make sure everything stays in place.

If the child is going to add a fake nose or chin, Pachota recommends sticking it on with latex, which is not as strong as spirit gum — and doesn't have as overpowering an odor either.

Applying clown makeup takes anywhere from 15 minutes to half an hour depending on the level of skill of the person applying the makeup. A practice session with the children before Halloween night is a good idea. "If you can get them to sit," Pachota said.

"With kids you're lucky to get one shot," she said.

MORE ELABORATE makeup is possible with adults, she said. A Detroit Tiger fanatic, for instance, could easily disguise himself as Sparky Anderson, the manager of the world champs.

A Tiger cap and uniform would start him off. A comb-through dye that washes out with shampoo would make his hair baseball white.

Adding those wrinkles that Sparky has accumulated through years of diligent sun worshiping would be relatively simple.

"Put layer on layer of latex (a glue normally used to attach fake hair)," Pachota said. "As it dries it wrinkles on its own."

The most time-consuming makeup is the werewolf transformation, she said.

It takes anywhere from 45 minutes to 1½ hours to make the change that Chaney used to make in seconds on the movie screen.

Some other tips from Pachota: • Mortician's wax makes for an appropriately pointy and drippy witch's chin.

• Eight to 15 layers of latex will give you an old man or old woman look. The wrinkles can be enhanced with a brown grease pencil.

A full-head mask gets pretty hot as the night wears on, and you might want to remove it. Take along a small Halloween makeup kit to put on a new face.

• When adding a prosthetic device such as a fake nose or ears, make sure the area of skin it's being applied to is dry. Spirit gum is best for keeping these heavy appendages attached — if you can take the smell.

For those who don't want to dabble in being their own makeup artists, Gags and Games will have makeup artists available by appointment for Halloween and for parties preceding the day itself, Pachota said.
