

Callahan gives a personal view of family

Harry Callahan was born in Highland Park 20 years ago. In 1968 he married Eleanor Kresna and they have three children. Barbara was born in 1964. From 1967-68 Harry took black and white photographs of his wife and of Barbara during her first seven years.

The result: a sensitive chronicle of family growth, artistic experimentation, and the relationship between man and nature as he grows in the Detroit landscape of Area 1.

While Eleanor and Barbara are often little more than faces amid Chicago streets and scenes, the summer winters of Lake Michigan and the late-September photographs only a close family could have captured these photographs.

That is especially evident in a series of mother-daughter photos in a hot summer afternoon. The summer light illuminates the scene, and a mother and daughter are seen in a park, a street, a building and a park. The photographs are all taken on the same day in early morning.

CALLAHAN also captures the Chicago city scene with his loved ones. Whether walking through Grant Park, or on a downtown street scene, or swimming in Lake Michigan the creative tension in the summer-photography is palpable.

Also interesting is Callahan's view of his own life. He photographed himself in many ways, or what is meant to be taken as subjects in the shadows, standing in a dark corner and seen more clearly. This series is new to the whole picture by Harry

an attempt to be particular. Some of Harry's Barbara photos, showing a momentary glimpse of her face, are touching in their simplicity and their beauty. They appear to be in great contrast to lighting and composition, but really seem to be a photographic effect.

The major portion of the exhibit is more studies of Eleanor, embracing with simple and intimate negatives. There is enough variety here among the light and shadow to make the treatment more personal and revealing than most photographs of people many would.

Throughout the show the prevailing view of the parent-child bond is that the viewer beyond the subject matter into the life of a family. The photographs are not just a series of snapshots, but a series of moments that tell a story.

Callahan has just had a distinguished career as a teacher at the Institute of Design in Chicago and the Chicago State University in Chicago area where he worked in 1977.

It seems fitting to show that Harry and Eleanor Callahan became grandparents in Emilio Garcia's story in *Milwaukee* and Barbara Callahan Ballinger in *1981*. The cycle begins here.
