Need for firefighters grows with city

Full-time firefighters in Farmington Hills will work longer hours in a short week to cover an increased demand for medical and fire calls during mid-tolate afternoon. The revised schedule, effective Dec.

The revised schedule, effective Dec. 3, calls (or the eight full-time fire-fighters to work from 7.30 am. to 6 mm., four days a week. The depart-ment's 81 paid call-back firelighters in turn will have to fill in more bours, at least equal to eight, 10-hour shifts to make the schedule work, sald Fire Chief Richard Marinucci. The cost to taxpayers for the addi-tional hours put in by the paid call-back firelighters and additional pay for the full-time employees has been budgeted at approximately \$1,100, said City Manager William Costick.
