

# 7 Schoolcraft Presidential Finalists Named

Two vice presidents under Schoolcraft Community College President Dr. Eric Bradner are among seven finalists competing to succeed him when he retires next year.

A Maryland community college president and four other persons currently holding college or university level administrative positions are the other five contenders.

Four of the seven were recommended for trustees' consideration by a board-appointed presidential search committee of representatives of various factions of the college. A fifth designee withdrew at the last minute.

Three candidates, including the two vice presidents, were added to the list by board action immediately after acceptance of the committee recommendations in a special session July 30.

The abrupt additions have sparked open criticism from spokesmen for two leading segments of the college and an undercurrent of criticism from within and without the campus.

THE FOUR candidates recommended by the search committee are:

- Dr. Moses S. Koch, president of Egges Community College in Maryland.
- Dr. John Forbes, vice president of Miami-Dade Junior College in Florida.
- Dr. C. Nelson Grote, dean of the school of applied sciences of Morehead State University, Kentucky.
- Dr. Daniel R. McLaughlin, associate dean of faculty of Queensborough Community College of the City University of New York.

THE THREE ADDED by board action the same night are:

- Raymond Howe, director of labor relations of Dearborn public schools and Henry Ford Community College.
- Dr. Robert Keene, vice president for instruction at Schoolcraft.
- W. Kenneth Lindner, vice president for business affairs, Schoolcraft Community College.

The full list of seven names was released by the board. The breakdown of recommended and added names was revealed by critics and confirmed by Board President Jane K. Moehle of Plymouth.

ACCORDING TO Mrs. Moehle, an ex-officio committee member, the three additional names completed a list of eight from which the committee chose its final five.

The Observer Newspapers learned from reliable sources that Lindner didn't apply, ei-

ther, but responded to an invitation from the committee.

The day after the board announced its acceptance of the committee report and recommendations in full, and its addition of the three names, student action ballooned.

STUART BLOOM, history instructor and president of the Schoolcraft Faculty Forum, volunteered the opinion that "some members" of the search committee felt they had been "duped" when the board added its names.

Tom Winkler, president of the Student Senate, said, "We condemn their action. By submitting their own candidates the board has made a mockery of the committee, which was made up of all factions of the college."

Bloom stated, "Dr. Keene is not the mind the students and faculty would want."

Trustee John LaRue, co-chairman of the search committee, said Monday, "It's the board's prerogative to add names and they decided to do it. To get the report accepted."

December when the board established the search committee of board members, administrators, faculty, student, alumni and foundation representatives.

Committee members were approved late in January with LaRue as chairman and Trustee Robert Geake of Northville as co-chairman.

Members appointed upon nomination of their respective authorities were:

- Russell Bogarin and Patrick Butler for the administration;
- A. Russell Clarke and Jan Reel for the foundation;
- Lowell Cook and Lawrence Galtis for the Faculty Forum; Mrs. Roslyn Keilman and James Foley for the alumni; and Miss Noel Little and Mark McQuestin (replacing Lynn Vori) for the Student Senate.

From approximately 240 letters of application received by the committee, 16 candidates were invited for interview and 14 completed committee interviews on the campus.

Interviews with the seven finalist will commence in September, the board announced.

By approving an official

press release naming the finalists, the board departed from the protective silence that most institutions observe in such personnel matters. LaRue, for one, had previously advocated observing "non-release" posture.

In this instance, given the controversy erupting from the "added" names, the list was likely to become public regardless.
