Harrison students score in math competition

Fourteen Harrison High School students finished in the top 5 percent of Part I of the Twenty-Eighth Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition and were among approximately 1,000 Michigan students to compete in the final examination on Wednesday, Dec. 5.

Harrison High School math students who qualified for the second test were: Elizabeth Bogan, Brian Freeman, Steven Gerencsich, Ulrich Greiner, Martin Heilmann, Jordan Lowy, William Ritter, George Sarcevic, Mark Schler, John Suh, Jason Talbert, Aaron Tam, David Traill and Eric Wein.

This competition is sponsored by the Michigan Section of the Mathematical Association of America and is designed to foster a wider interest in mathematics, to focus attention on the necessity for mathematical training in most professions and trades, and to identify and provide scholarships for capable mathematics students in the State of Michigan.

The approximately 100 winners of the competition will be honored at the Awards Program at Alma College on Saturday, March 2, 1985, with half of the winners receiving college scholarships. These scholarships totaled \$15,500 in last year's competition. The competition funds include contributions from the Burroughs Corp., Ford Motor Co., the Upjohn Co., Michigan Bell, the Kuhlman Corp. and the Michigan Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Roy Birmingham, math teacher, has served as the high school supervisor for Harrison High School students competing in the examination.
