Group home offers a break with the past

For six developmentally disabled adults, it was a major break with the

adults, it was a major preax with the past.

After living all or most of their lives with their parents, they were moving out. On Nov. 12, the four women and two men took up residence at Redford Opportunity House (ROH), a new group home on Beech Daly just north of Six Mile.

"In the first couple of days, a couple of the clients were a little bit homesick," home administrator Larry Schmidt said. "But now they really enjoy the move.

Schmidt said. "But now they really enjoy the move.

"A few were tooking forward to it because they knew they were moving away from morn and dad, sort of like going away to college, that sort of feeling."

"In some ways it's tougher on the families, who've had their son or daughter at home for years and years,"

of the Community Opportunity Center (COC), a non-profit corporation that op-crates that home and two others.

THE HOME was financed through a Michigan State Housing Department Authority (MSHDA) mortgage. Operating costs are paid for through the rest denis Social Security, Department of Mental Health or MSHDA payments, plus \$50 a day per client in state moneys.

It cost \$138,000, Wheeler said, which It cost \$138,000, Wheeler said, which includes the expense of making the home barrier free to comply with federal regulations. For instance, the home has extra-wide hallways, special ramps, handicapper bars in the bath-rooms and a ceiling of double-thick drywall for fire protection. One of the residents is wheelchair-bound.

The home is part of a continuum within the COC program, Schmidt said. ROH is at one end of the continuum, and a new apartment complex for the

developmentally disabled in Garden City, expected to be completed in the spring, will be at the other end. In between are COC's two other group homes, the Plymouth and Livonia opportunity houses.

The ROH residents don't have as many "everyday life skille" as the residents of the Plymouth and Livonia home. Schmidt said. This does that home Schmidt said. This does that have a supportunity to the complete and being able to work independently so they can go on to the insterim homes or perhaps straight to the semi-independent living of the apartment complex.

"Our overall goal is to provide the least restrictive environment as possible for them and to move them to more of an independent-living environment when they're ready." Schmidt said.

THE ROH residents range in age from 26 to 38. All have been living at home with their parents, allough one has spent some time in an institution.

"They all need direction right now,"

Schmidt said. "They all came from their homes, where their parents had a tendency to do more for them."

The residents have specific individual goals they are working on. They are learning to do their own intundry and some of their own cooking. A chart on the refrigerator spells out the household chores each is responsible for in a given week, such as taking out the garbage and sweeping the floor, whiping the tables and countertops, or washing the pots and pans and putting the food away.

During the day, five of the residents.

During the day, live of the residents go to a sheltered workshop, the Northwest Workshop of the Wayne County Association for the Retarded, where they do minor assembly and factory work and some academic work.

The residents also participate in outside activities such as exercise classes, dances, swimming and bowling.

"We have tried to provide as many activities as possible, and it's good therapy," Schmidt said.
