Tired of shopping crowded malls and long lines? "Twentleth Century American Drawings: The Figure in Context" exhibition will bring a welcome break and at the same time enchance the holiday

season. This major exhibition of 90 figurative images is a comprehensive overview of American art through the perspective of drawing, a medium whereby the hand of the artist remains visible. The show explores the figure as a major or minor-element in landscape, cityscape, interiors, or fantavidesim.

The drawings are done in a variety of media including watercolor, pencil, ink, charcoal, and pastel. They range in size from small, intimate sketches to commanding large-scale images with the impart of the state of the state of the state of the state

In "Dazie-2" by Idelle Weber, 1982-83, a listless
figure is resting on a folding lounge in the late afternoon sun. In this charcoal drawing, the follage is
dark, intense and active, forming an interesting
contrast to the languid figure, the follage is

ord diverse and changing styles from early turnodthe-century nec-classicism to modern photo-realism and abstraction.

In addition, a commercial illustration by Charles Dana Gibson (also known as designer of the "Gibson Girl" fashlon) is represented. In "His Granddaugher Discovers That He Knows The Words of the Star Spangled Banner," 1920, the fashlonable clothes are as important as the figures. In this black ink and pen over pencil illustration, the figures, in wry humor respond to the singer.

Since many drawings are preliminary to another medium, it is interesting to view the drawing for the off-reproduced "Nighthawks," 1942, by Edward Hopper. The smokey blue tones of the drawing communicate the sense of urban isolation of the well-known painting.

Adjacent to the drawing is "Nighthawks Revisited," 1930, by Red Grooms. Although Grooms has followed the major elements of the original composition, he has spoofed it by Including Hopper at the counter, himself as the counter-man, as a "punk" hairdo.

ALSO FEATURED in the exhibition are Richard Diebenkorn, Philip Pearistein, Tom Wesselmann and Mel Ramos in studies of the nude mode); Stuart Davis, George Grosz, Reginald Marsh, John Sloan in glimpses of urban life; Alexander Calder, George Bellows and Alfred Leslie in depictions of acrobats, athletes and dancers; and powerful abstract figures by Philip Guston, Robert Motherwell, Mark Rothko, and David Smith.

Other artists represented are Will Barnet, Jack Beal, Sidney Goodman and contemporary New York graffill artist, Kelth Haring.

As this exhibition traces the figure through the 20th century, it is apparent that man continues to be a compelling artistic subject.

The exhibition runs through December. Admission is \$3 for general adult public, \$2 for museum members, senior cilirons, students (18 and over), \$1 for children.
