## Ex-Falcon star joins hall of fame

By Scott Adler staff writer a man be didn't like, then Mark Churelia never met a man be didn't like then Mark Churelia never met a man who didn't like product from Farmington High School in 1975, was one of those special athletes whose outstanding physical taient was outshooe only by personal qualities of leadership and esprit de corps. "He would show up in his varsity letter jacket at the novice meet and cheer on the first year wrestlers," his high school coach, Dick Cook, said, "Wrestling is an individual sport, but he made it a team sport. He had the kind of leadership that made everybody else do well." If there's one thing that Churelia could do, it was lead by example. In his three years of varsity wrestling at Farmington, Churelia compiled an incredible 123-7 won-loss record that included 94 pins and one state championship in the 155-pound weight class. He was 80-1 over his junior and senior years.

"HE WAS probably the best any-body ever saw in Michigan," Cook

"HE WAS probably the best any-body ever saw in Michigan," Cook said. "And that's not just because I coached him. He was extremely com-petitive and had an incredible desire to win."

Churella's career accomplishments didn't stop with his high school graduation either. He went on to become a four-time All-American and three-time NCAA Wrestling Champion at the University of Michigan. As a freshman at U-M, he finished third nationally.

Recently he received yet another bonor — he has been inducted into the Michigan State Amateur Hall of Fame in Mt. Pleasant.

"R feels fine," the 27-year-old Churella said about his induction. "I guess I was a little surprised, but I'm happy about II.

After his incredible career at U-M. Churella went to the University of Nevada at Las Vegas to take over the reins as wrestling coach. He stayed there for five years until the wrestling program was dropped in compliance with Title IX.

CHURELLA RETURNED to Michigan in August and went to work with his father in the family insurance, mortage and brokerage business in Farmington. He has also taken up caching again at his alma mater, U-M, as an assistant.

"I wanted to stay active in wrestling, and I'm very pleased with how things have worked out."

But then, Cook never had any doubt that things wouldn't work out for someone like Churella.

"The thing I remember most about coaching there (at Farmington) was how, until Mark came along, there was never an undefeated season or a league champlonahly. Cook said, "And they had a good program too. But when Mark got there, there were three years of never losing a dual meet and three league titles. He was the most dedicated athlete I ever saw. He had a good and he worked as hard as he could to reach it. He's a self-made person.
