JACOBS, whose first love and in-terest was contemporary art, found she was reaching farther back in history to explain what she was see-ing and experiencing in modern art.

She said she feels strongly that ancient pieces of good quality with a fine sense of proportion and aesthet-ic appeal transcend time and carry a uniqueness that can never be du-plicated in modern works.

She added that every piece in the embition possesses these qualities, it identifiable, and was personally selected by her. Even a common pottery storage vessel or an Errustan borse in this fit controlled for utilitarian purposes can be a special work of art of beat-tifully erecuted.

The "Head of Medusa" is an ex-

ample of such an exquisitely ren-dered artifact. Part of a ceremonial vessel, this rare terra cotta third century B.C. object reveals Medusa in her youth and classic original beauty.

The serpent-like tresses curl around a lovely face as yet unchanged. The head has a decided ontward thrust, almost like the head on a prove of a ship. The back of the piece is gracefully secoped.

THE ONLY pieces of art that don't qualify as ancient, yet belong in the embruon, are the highly sophisticated rugs formed by the 6-11-year-old children of the Village Workshops of Egypt.

Young Egyptian children create on home as naturally as American children draw with crayons. These brightly colored textiles foomed in characteristic Egyptian style are an outgrowth of an educational experiment that began in 1952.

The age of the child can be dis-cerned by the complexity of the im-ages, intricacies of pattern, textures and coloration.

The CCAM is a group of people who have an in-terest in all of the art forms as they are developing in Mothigan — be in the aveas of music, painting poetry, dance, theater, etc. This group came into being last year. A STUDY has begun to clarify the contribution of the arts to the economy of our state. The study is surveying some of the basic cash flows of the arts organizations, in particular investigating the amount of cash flow that they might receive from the state (in the form of grants, etc.) in comparison to the amount that they pay back (in the form of taxes, salaries, etc.)

This study hopes to involve about 2,000 arts organizations and even though not all of the questions will be answered by all involved, a 45 percent answer rate account.
