## Pianist Bartkiewicz highlights concert

Following a program by the South-field Symphony Orchestra a week car-lier. I had the opportunity to listen to another prominent community orches-tra — the Rochester Symphony Orches-tra. Besides the advantage of being close to home, this program had sever-

al other aspects to recommend it, even for ears that have been acoustically spoiled by the sound of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. Conductor James Hohmeyer has a talent for combining the profound and the popular lato a meaningful event. The classical part consisted of works by Bach, Shostakovich and Chopin, with popular Christmas tunes by Anderson

sprinkled in between.

TOWARD the end, the Good Times Quartet, a barbershop-style group of talented ladies was featured and the audience participated in enhantsatic singing of Christians across.

It was evident that the orchestra felt more at ease with the popular selections, exhibiting good tone quality and unabashed enhantsants, in Anderson's Christians Featival, the simplistic tune of 'Jingle Bells' emerged with impressive, aimost symphonic significance. In the classical selections the musicians had their share of difficulties, to be sure, but there was no lack of rewarding moments. Bach's Brandenhog Concreto No. 5 is one of the most enderged concreto No. 5 is one of the most in its first movement or illiant cadenza in its first movement.

Harpsichordist David Butzu, a stu-dent of Mischa Kottler, was convincing and impressive. The lightning fast runs in the cadenza were well executed, with the exception of a couple of minor

snags.

The other soloists, flutist Wendy Par-dee, principal in her section, and con-cerimaster Alan Macnair, were equally impressive.

THE ROLE of the string orchestra was less than perfect, but acceptable. While there were some problems in terms of technique and intonation, stylistically they were on the right track, which is more that one could say about some control particles of the string of the string perfect of the string perfect of the string of th

portant. The orchestral part, on the other hand, was the only aspect of the program that was truly terrible, and that was one occasion in which one could feel grateful for the fact that Chopin gave the orchestra a very limited role in his concertos.

The true star of the evening was the Polish-born planist Leszek Bart-kiewicz, who has been gaining in prominence here in the last couple of years.

His technique was most secure, with the plane passages thundering with au-thority in the outer movement and elic-iting an exquisite, expressive touch in

Bartklewicz would have been a cred-it to any major symphony orchestra with this performance. It is hoped that some day he will achieve that opportu-nity—he truly deserves it.

This is not meant to downgrade the value of the Rochester Symphony Orchestra, however. Given the perspective, it is a fine enthusiastic community orchestra. It has been serving the com-munity well for more than 20 years, and it is hoped that it will continue to do so for many years to come.

## Soloist provides exciting moments

Ford Audittorium was full almost to capacity last Thursday, a rare occurence in the regular subscription series of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. Most tibings have a reason, however, and this was no exception. The sefections on the program were attractive, with a proven track record. These consisted of the Farlms Violin Concerto, the Symphony No. 9 "New World" by Dvorak with the Preduct to the First Act of Lohengrin, by Wagner, as an opening piece.

with the Prelude to the First Act of Lobengria, by Wagner, as an open-ing piece. This was the second consecutive program under Music Director Gunther Herbig. The guest soloist was violinist Pierre Amoyal. This French violinist was substituted for Henryk Szeryng, who had to cancel because of extreme fatigue. The name of Szeryng, among the world's most renowned violinists, explains the large crowd.

WHILE Sterying's cancellation was most regrettable, Amoyal possesses a considerable talent. His name isn't nearly as well known, but his is likely to change in the future, Amoyal appeared with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra last season, performing the Berg violin concerno. This time, he proved that he can be most impressive with a familiar selection as well.

One of the major challenges in performing a familiar work is being vulnerable to comparisons. Amoy-al's performance wasn't one of the cleanest I have heard. Some passagcleanest I have heard. Some passages, the introductory run in the first movement, for example, were lack-

ing in precision.

Another flaw was in the second

movement, in which many passages sounded too casual, falling to savor the expressive quality of the slow notes. Other aspects of the work, however, compensated for these shortcomings.

The themes in the first movement were presented with authority. The main theme in the last movement were presented with authority. The main theme in the last movement commanded respect with its forceful thirds. The BSO was also equal to the task under Herbig, Most impressive was the coda in the final moyement, which was one of the fastest versions I have heard, yet it radiated with brilliance, with both soloits and orchestra exhibiting uncompromised precision.
