Wayne State University has only been a state institution since 1956. Before that it was Wayne University operated by the Detroit board of education.

Once confined to a single building, the WSU campus areas have grown to 180 acres, nearly all in the center of Detroit and its programs are conducted in 107 buildings. Twenty-eight of these buildings have been constructed since

1960. The total enrollment is in excess of 33,000.

Wayne came into being in August 1933 when the Detroit school board united several institutions of higher learning which were then under the board's jurisdiction. These included the colleges of liberal arts, education, medicine, engineering, pharmacy and the graduate school. After that the school added the former Detroit City Law School.

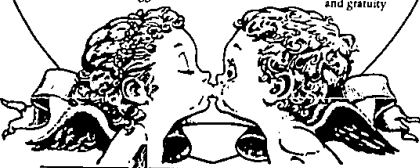
