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Women on the Go She Believes Women Rate Better Opportunities

"WE NEED more women in part time jobs," she said, "maybe two women doing the same job and thus keeping up their family responsibilities."

"We need to think more about using women in fields traditionally men's. It seems to be part of our culture to limit women's fields -- I mirrored in economics in college and often was the only girl in a class in that subject."

"Women certainly wouldn't want to give up their child-bearing role, but after that part of our work is complete we should be able to go on."

"Most important, we need to stop drifting and think carefully about how to use our womanpower. We need ideas from everyone -- both the young and the older generations."

MRS. PETTIPREN set forth some of her ideas in a spring hearing on sex bias in employment before the House section of joint Senate-House committee.

"My husband encouraged me to testify," she said, "and I wanted to do so because I felt that the feminist movement and its spokesmen don't really represent me."

"I lead a happy life -- I don't feel the need to protest. But I feel this is a problem that confronts all of us and deserves a lot of thought."

MRS. PETTIPREN's happy life includes a varied diet of politics, a busy family and work at the university.

She and her family have known public life for years, since Vincent Pettipren was a Nankin Township trustee before running for his present seat in the House of Representatives six years ago.

"I think our family is closer because of our political interests," she said. "We have to work to find time to be together, but we do."

After Pettipren announced he would seek a State Senate seat, his wife asked their 17-year-old son, Vincent, how he thought the campaign time could be made easier for the nine-year-old of the family, Peter.

"Do just about what you and dad did for me," was the answer. "Let him help and feel he's a part of the campaign."

MRS. PETTIPREN said young Vincent has said definitely he doesn't want a career in public life, but she isn't sure about the feelings of Vicki, 14, or five-year-old twins, Paula and Patti.

For herself, she feels sure she'll keep on combining the roles of wife, mother and woman leader.

"I sometimes feel it would be nice to pull back and just be a wife and helper," she said, "but women have just begun to feel their fuller responsibility to society. Sometimes it's difficult, but we must accept this responsibility."
