Former city clerk Trena Quinn, dies

Former Farmington City Clerk Trena M. Quinn of Farmington died Feb. 16 in Oak Hill Nursing Home after a long illness. She was born in Michigan on Oct. 8, 1904.

She retired as city clerk on July 1, 1968. She was appointed by the Farmington City Council on April 9, 1957.

On Dec. 17, 1945 she joined the Groves-Walker Unit 346, American Legion Auxiliary where she held the office of president twice, 1946-1949 and 1957-1958.

Other offices she held throughout the years were: chairwoman of Constitution & Bylaws, Girls State and Poppy chairwoman and the unit treasurer for 10 years. In 1952, an 18th District was formed. She became the first president of this District from 1952 until 1953. In 1954 she was elected third president

for the state of Michigan serving from 1954 until 1955.

She served as parliamentarian for the Department of Michigan 1975-1976. Trena Quinn was an employee of the Fred Sander's Bakery during the '50s as a store manager.

Mrs. Quinn was preceded in death by her husband, Harold. She is survived by her daughters, Nancy Herrington and Betty Gail; eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren; one brother, Elmer Catherman.


