SENIOR ADULT TAX ASSISTANCE
Senior adults can receive assistance with preparation of 1984 federal, state, homestead and energy audit forms. Please be prepared when you come. Bring your 1984 "W" form and 1099 forms, the amount of real estate taxes or rent paid in 1984 and to whom. A copy of your 1985 return is helpful. All

assistance remains confidential and free. The program will be held at the Senior Adult Center on the following Tuesdays: March 12, 19 and 26; April 2 and 9.

Mixing old and new discussed by architect

With each new age comes new styles of architecture.

Throughout the years, buildings of varying styles have often been able to stand side by side without much visual disruption. Now, "the clash between the old and new is often clearly in evidence," according to New York architect Giorgio Cavaglieri, the next guest speaker in the Lawrence Institute of Technology School of Architecture's ARCHITECTURE series.

Cavaglieri, the LIT School of Architecture's 1985 Visiting Professor, will present, "A Contribution to Preservation in New York," at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 7 in the architecture auditorium on LIT's campus, 21000 W. 10 Mile, Southfield.

The presentation is open to the public free.

Educated in Milan and Rome, Cavaglieri writes that in the past, different architectural styles did not overpower

or interfere with each other "because the volume and technology remained unchanged. Today, however, new technologies, the existence of different economic goals, and the pressure of exploiting land use create a set of conditions in the urban center that has permitted the environment to be mismanaged."

Highly respected for his insights in restoration and preservation, Cavaglieri has worked on over 50 historic landmark building-reuse projects. Included are such noted building reuse projects as: the National Museum of Building

Arts (Pension Building), Jefferson Market Branch Library, the New York Shakespeare Festival Public Theater, the Vanderbilt Mansion and the Incoming Train Room in Grand Central Station. Architectural Record has declared that his restoration of the New York Public Library "resounds of patience and infinite care."

As a part of his frequent visits to campus, Giorgio Cavaglieri will participate in three ARCHITECTURE presentations.

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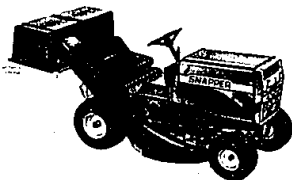


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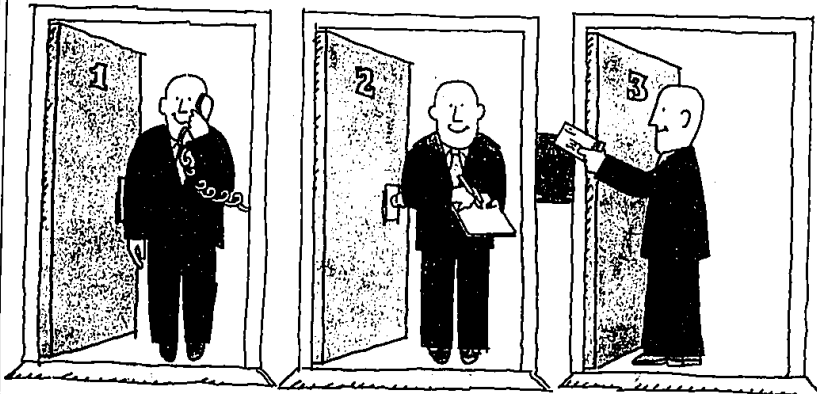
