And so be came up with his first Polish American Calendar. This year, Samull's 10th anniversary edition is actually a trivia game with multiple choice questions on every date and a game board in the middle.
The calendar, which started with ilbrary research and elipping newspaper articles on Polish matters, was just the start of Samull's research into his roots.
