BROTHERTON'S STATEMENT then turned to how the city would handle what many believe is a

weakness of the annexation method — that it does not automatically provide for a new charter. "We recognize that as the city grows, our existing city charter may require revision..." he admitted. If growth necessitates a charter revision, Brotherton added, "we will call for a full review of the charter by a charter commission."

MSU Invites Area Leaders To Seminar

FARMINGTON Community leaders of the Farmington Area will be meeting Aug. 25 to conduct an informal seminar to discuss future governmental change for the area. The meeting is being sponsored by the Institute for Community Development and Services of Michigan State University.

The consolidation question was placed on the ballot and defeated by a narrow margin by the City of Farmington last November.

Within the past few months, members of the Institute have been interviewing Farmington community leaders in an effort to evaluate its study.

IT WAS THE Institute which prepared the "Farmington Area Governmental Organization Study" which had recommended consolidation of the four governmental units in the Farmington Area as the best alternative available.

THE INTERVIEWS held after defeat of consolidation, took the approach of "where do we go from here?"

Conducting the interview was Abe Snyder, a community development specialist with the Institute.

Representatives of each governmental unit in the Farmington Area and community leaders have been invited by the Institute to attend the Aug. 25 meeting in Farmington Township Hall to exchange views on how boundary stability can best be obtained for the area.

AMONG THE topics to be discussed are:

1. How state or local conditions have changed since the MSU study on governmental organization was completed, and the implications of those changes to governance of the Farmington Area; and
2. Can the community study process, as it was done in Farmington area, be an effective means of resolving problems connected with providing governmental services in suburbia?

Baby Bachman

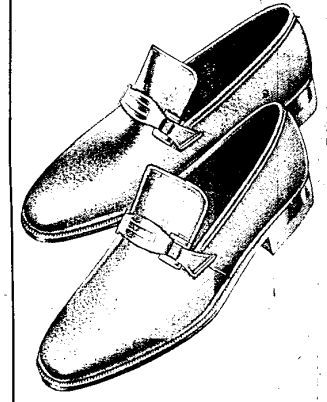
