The city will "see if we can't work out a mutually agreeable plan of solv-ing the problem of the barricade and the paving." Costick said. Metroview is not a private drive, the mayor told those at the Monday meet-ing. "You have a very parochial view of it, and i don't blame yoo. "Thappen to be one who's in favor of paving," Dollan said. "We're ready for action of some type." City legislators voted 3-to-2 March 11 to reject a proposal to establish a special assessment district for Metro-view's paving, A special assessment al-

lows the city to tax residents living along the roadway for the paving.

At their Feb. 19 meeting, council members rejected the paving of the road from Eight Mile Road to Green Hill Road. A lie vote had defeated that proposal.

Following the Feb. 19 council meet-ing, Urnis had contacted the city. The developer offered to increase his ex-penditure on the paving to \$60,000, nearly three times the original amount he had been willing to pay.

That proposal reduced the resident share of the cost by \$530, but also in-creased the city's share by \$4,500, from \$81,500 to \$65,800.
