#### FARMINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES

Since the Farmington Public Schools has authority to establish the number of mills to be levied from within its authorized millage rate, and since the Truth in Taxation Act, as signed into law on February 9, 1982, mandates that a Public Hearing be held on any proposed additional millage rate, the Farmington Public Schools will hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, May 7, 1985, 7:00 p.m., at the Administration Building, 32500 Shiawassee Street, Farmington Michigan.

Thus, the Board will have an opportunity to receive testimony and discuss the levy of the proposed additional millage rate for the ensuing fiscal year.

Presently, the Farmington Board of Education is authorized to levy 37.29 mills for operating purposes. The amounts actually levied during the past several years are listed:

The District's proposed budget for 1985-86 provides for cexpenditures of \$49,733,690. Anticipated tax revenues, callowed by law, will create a shortfall in balancing the budget. The tax rate which may be levied is limited to an amount which would generate the tax revenues of the previous year from the same tax base, except that the Board of Education, by Resolution, may increase the tax rate. Therefore, the Board of Education has proposed, by Resolution at the April 23, 1985 Board Meeting, to increase the millage levy for the 1985-86 school year to 1.2 mills over the base tax rate, for an operating tax rate of 32.5 mills which is 5 mills less than the 1984-85 rate of 33 mills. This additional levy will produce revenues of approximately 3.6% over those allowed by the Base Tax Rate, and will permit the District to balance its proposed operating budget.

The public should note that the maintain authorized millage for operating purposes is 37.29 mills. The recommendation for the 1985-86 levy is 32.5 mills, 4.79 mills less than the authorized millage.

The Board of Education has proposed this millage in recognition of the responsibility to maintain and sustain meffective educational program for the community.


