Historical setting is site for show

The first Village Antiques Show, May 16-18, will be in the most natural of settings, Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village. It is also a benefit for those two interlocked institutions.

The collectors and resident authorities on various types of antiques who are behind this show are many. Out in front as chairpersons are Bill and Bobbi Mullen and Fred and Mimi Reed.

Cost of MS is high for individual, society

Every week nearly 200 people are told they have multiple sclerosis (MS), a disease whose cause is still unknown, and which seems to strike young adults most often. The disease affects at least 250,000 Americans. It also affects society as a whole in terms of costs needed for research and treatment, and the loss of productive manpower in many industries.

Multiple sclerosis is a chronic, often disabling disease that affects the brain and the spinal cord. When a person has MS, the covering — myelin — that protects the nerves in the brain and spinal cord is affected so that messages cannot always get through. Myelin protects the nerve fibers of the brain and spinal cord in the same way that insulation protects electrical wires. When this sheathing is destroyed, the nerve impulses are interrupted and distorted, resulting in tingling sensations, numbness, slurred speech, double vision, muscle weakness, poor coordination and perhaps even paralysis.

Detecting multiple sclerosis can be difficult because early symptoms are often so slight a person doesn't go to a doctor; also, other diseases of the nervous system have some of the same warning signs and laboratory tests are not yet available to definitely confirm or rule out possible MS.

MS CAN mean long years of increasing disability and constant uncertainty, caused by the unexpected exacerbations and remissions which are characteristic of this disease.

According to Vice Admiral Thor Hanson, president of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society (NMSS), the lifetime costs of each year's new case-

load of MS patients may easily range up to \$3 billion.

Adequate funding of MS research and support for MS rehabilitation centers may help ease this economic burden on individuals and our society, experts agree. Rehabilitation services, for instance, help people with MS operate at functional levels, thus keeping them off welfare, Social Security rolls and unemployment. Finding a cure for MS could save millions of dollars now needed for treatments, research and therapy.

The most recent developments in the understanding of multiple sclerosis stem from dramatic advances in fundamental science. This is particularly true in the fields of immunology, virology, genetics. Once the mechanism of MS is known, scientists will be on the way to finding an effective means of preventing or curing it.
