## Test your savvy as a valued guest

• 6. True. This is the signal that the cere-mony is about to begin. If you arrive later, stand unobstrusively at the back unless the ushers direct otherwise. It's best to try to arrive at least 10-15 minutes early.
7. True, You could offend if you reverse them. Other tips for negotiating a receiv-ing line: Introduce yourself to anyone who isn't certain to know you.

• 8. True, Although this was more common in the days when the beide and groom left the reception early in a shower of rice to go to their honeymoon. These days, some newlyweds stay right until the end of the party. An alternate rule might be, don't leave until the cake has been cut and served.
