An Oakland County commissioner, criticized by a fellow builder for constructing the new Rochester Hills courthouse, has received bipartisan backing from the county board.

THE BOARD OF commissioners last week approved 24-0 a resolution acknowledging Reweld as a principal in the construction firm building the 52nd District Court-ard Division.
Abstaining from the vote was Commissioner Rewold, who is president of Frank Rewold & Son Ice

Inc.

Rewold sought the board action after a state legislator asked Attorney General Frank Kelley to rule on whether Oakland County properly awarded a contract for the new courthouse.

AT THE REQUEST of Rochester Hills builder James Baldwin, state Rep. Matt Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, sought an opinion on the board's hiring of Dryden as developer for the district court.

Rewold's firm bid to construct the project for R.G. Dryden and Associates, which will lease the space to the county for 10 years.

Dunaskiss said state law requires three-fourths of the board to approve a contract in which a commissioner has an interest.

The vote in March to lease a courthouse from Dryden was 14-7. At the time, Rewold abstained from voting on the project.
"I'm not a lawyer, but this just looks as though it's wrong. But the resolution passed by the commissioners may take care of it."

THE HEAD OF the Republican caucus, Rewold said he told other commissioners he would be bidding on the project. He also asked the county's corporation counsel and its own attorney if there were

poration counsel and his own attorney if there were any conflict of interest.

"I haven't bid on any work that has gone through the Planning and Building Committee," said Rewold, who sits on the committee. "But this isn't a county project or a county structure. It's being built for a private corporation."


A third-generation family firm started by Rewold's father in 1918, the firm has built several area churches, the Avon Township Public Library and all Oakland University structures except Meadow Brook Hail and the Dodge farmhouse. It constructs new buildings as well as renovations.
