Festival committeemen call for entertainers

Eric and Betty Johnston, named entertainment directors for Farmington Founders Festival, are looking for performers to man the bandstand for three days in Downtown Shopping Center.

"We're looking for singers, dancers, barbershoppers, bands, actors, variety shows, magicians, acrobats, and performers who can tell us something about Farmington's founding fathers," said Eric Johnston, who owns and operates Johnston Dance Studios with his mother.

Both he and his mother are Farmington born and bred. His maternal grandparents moved here in the 1920's.

"We want entertaining acts, but as long as we're the entertainment directors, we are particularly interested in putting something on that stage that is significant to our founders; we want to hear from someone who can come up with something entertaining, but still knowledgeable about what this town is

all about and how it started," Johnston said.

"We'd also like to get in touch with ethnic groups so we can showcase the diversity of our city," he said.

JOHNSTON SAID that taking on the Founders Festival committee job was like "get back into the swing of things back home," for him.

Johnston is back home after 10 years abroad as first dancer with London City Ballet.

There is no money in the Founders Festival pot to pay entertainers.

"The entertainers are all volunteer and that's the way it should be. Hopefully it will be a pleasure for them to perform in observance of our founding fathers," Johnston said.

He will reply to messages left with Farmington-Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce, 474-3440. The Founder Festival dates are July 18-20.
