## Asthmatic youth offered free camp

For the asthmatic child, summer can be the time of year when he or she is cooped up in an air-conditioned, filtered indoor atmosphere to avoid allergens, heat stress, vigorous exercise and the like.

Camp Sun Deer, the free camp for asthmatic children sponsored by the American Lung Association of southeastern Michigan (ALASEM) and the Michigan Society for Respiratory Therapy (MSRT), hopes to charter a bus for 60-70 youngsters this summer.

Available to all Michigan children with significant asthma who are be-

tween ages 9-12. Camp Sun Deer camperships are not awarded on the basis of financial need. It is the goal of the Lung Association to expand the horizons of the asthmatic child who, without the constant medical supervision available at Camp Sun Deer, could not participate in the wide variety of activities offered at summer camp.
