Plymouth hosts pair of Michigan Open rounds

Two Plymouth golf courses are among seven selected statewide to host qualification rounds for the 1985 AAA Michigan Open, to be played at the new Jack Nicklaus Bear Course at Grand Traverse Resort Village the end of June.

Brace Burn Golf Club and Hilltop Golf Club will host qualifying rounds Monday, June 3.

With a \$50,000 purse — \$9,000 to the winner — Michigan Open officials expect an increase in the number of prospective qualifiers. Therefore, there will be seven qualification sites and two qualification dates.

June 3 qualifiers will be played at Katke Golf Club in Big Rapids, Bedford Valley CC in Battle Creek and the two Plymouth courses.

June 4 qualifiers will be conducted at Vassar Golf and Country Club in Schuss

Mountain and Chemung Hills CC in Howell.

THE STARTING field of 144 plus ties for the Michigan Open will come from these seven qualifiers and the exempt players. The championship field will be cut to the low 70s and ties after the first 36 holes, Saturday and Sunday, June 29-30.

Professional and amateur golfers residing in Michigan are eligible for the Open. Entry fee for the tourney is \$75. Entry forms are available from the Michigan PGA headquarters, 8600 PGA Drive, Walled Lake 48088, or from any PGA pro located at courses and clubs throughout the state.

— NOTICE — PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS TO EIGHT MILE RD. (M-102)

All interested citizens are advised that the Michigan Department of Transportation is proposing to widen and resurface Eight Mile Road (M-102) from Grand River Avenue (M-5) easterly 4.2 miles to the Southfield Freeway (M-24) in the cities of Detroit and Southfield and Redford Township in Wayne and Oakland Counties. The proposed project calls for adding a fourth travel lane for each direction of Eight Mile Road. This would be accomplished by paving the outside shoulder and installing curb and gutter at the edge of this new pavement. The existing pavement would be recycled and the road resurfaced. As part of this project, the two bridges carrying Eight Mile Road over the River Rouge would be widened to carry an additional lane. This widening would occur on the median side of the roadways to avoid disruption to the Telegraph (US-24) ramps. This project would not require the acquisition of any additional right-of-way.

Under Federal and State Policy, any citizens who would be affected by the proposed project may request in writing, that a formal public hearing be held concerning the social, environmental and economic effects of this proposal. As required by Federal regulations, an Environmental Assessment has been prepared. Studies and coordination for this project demonstrate that implementing the proposed action will not have a significant impact upon the quality of the environment. Copies of the Environmental Assessment for this project may be obtained from the addresses below.

Those disagreeing with the determination set forth in the Environmental Assessment, or those requesting a public hearing are invited to furnish written comments summarizing the specific substantive and factual basis for such opposition. Please address those comments to:

Stevenson kickers knock Bentley out of state tourney

Livonia Stevenson continued its mastery over city rival Bentley in girls soccer Tuesday night, scoring a convincing 4-0 victory in a regional semifinal game.

The Spartans will go after their third straight regional title Saturday at Northville.

"I was nervous about this game because we had beat them five times in a row, and a team as good as Bentley is, they could beat you," said Stevenson coach Norrene Divens. "This was the very last time we would play this team (Bentley is closing) and it's been a big rivalry."

Stevenson, the state's No. 1 team, dominated from the start to finish.

Freshman Mary Pelloni opened the scoring on a beautiful shot from Lisa Broccardo's free kick.

Senior Mary Kay Hussey then went to work, scoring two goals before the half, with Paula Divens assisting on both, giving the Spartans a commanding 3-0 advantage.

HUSSEY THEN wrapped things up with her third goal of the night, a turn-around shot, from Sue Zatorski in the second half.

Hussey, however, paid the price for victory. She was injured in a collision with the Bentley goalkeeper and was seen leaving the field with an ice pack on her arm.

Stevenson limited Bentley to 15 shots, due to the standout back row play of Marcel Jamroz, Lisa Broccardo and Danielle Montroy. Goalie Doreen Beagle made several key saves as well as backup Elaine Zager, who preserved the shutout.

Equally as strong were midfielders Hussey, Divens and Stephanie Beck, along with forwards Lori Green, Leasa Klix, Pelloni and Zatorski.

Stevenson enters the regional final with a 15-0-1 record. Bentley, which plays its final game today at Plymouth Salem, is 16-3 overall. All of the Bulldog defeats came at the hands of Stevenson.

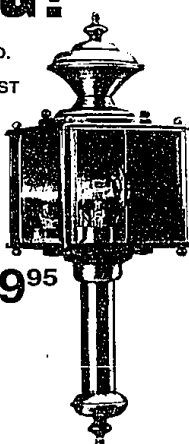
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
