

Planned Arena May Be Joint Venture

BOARD TRUSTEE Aldo Vagozzi said: "We, Bloomfield Township feels left out but as a school board we would insist that everyone in the school district be treated as first class citizens."

Farmington baseball fans were also disturbed about the proposed arena, which would uproot one diamond already on the site.

Although city officials have assured the relocation of the diamond at the new Drake Road park, several residents were still concerned about more facilities for baseball.

"We need more diamonds and can't buy our own property," said Ed Day of South Farmington Base-

ball for Boys. "The diamonds are already overcrowded."

THE PROPOSED CIVIC arena will be used for hockey and ice skating during the winter months.

The baseball supporters stressed they weren't trying to create rivalry between the sports, but as one resident mentioned: "The baseball program hasn't cost the city a cent."

Ellis explained: "If we are going to pay for the building we must generate a basic income from charging for the use of ice time." He felt that enough money would be collected for the arena to break even.

In addition to concern over the baseball situa-

tion, James Piatt, an unsuccessful candidate for the school board this year, asked why the board hadn't sold the land before and why another site couldn't be chosen like the land owned by the city near Alta Loma subdivision.

"We haven't yet determined whether the land is of no more use to us," explained Kenneth Perrin, board vice president.

Councilman Richardson said, "The value of the property depends on what it's zoned for. If it would be rezoned for hamburger stands, businesses would love it. But I think we would like to keep it for educational or recreational purposes."

The councilman also said that the five acres of land near Alta Loma sub isn't enough for the civic

arena, which itself covers four acres, with two acres of parking on Shiawassee and two additional acres already located at Farmington High School for parking.

"This is the first progress I've seen in creating recreational facilities," said Harry Fitzpatrick, a Farmington resident for 16 years.

"We shouldn't let all this get into a political football," continued Fitzpatrick.

"We need both ball parks and a civic arena. I'd like to see our township and city officials get something going. We've been very lax in this whole area of recreation."

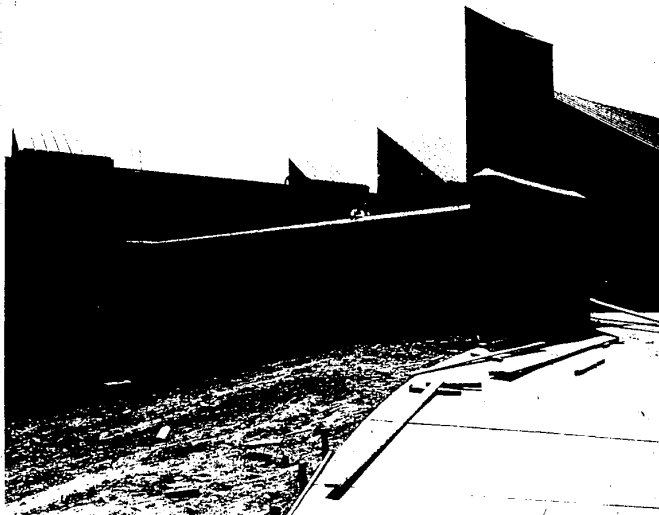
