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# State Slates Hearing On Edison Rate Request AIR CONDITIONING

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The utility, which serves 1.5 million customers in 13 south-eastern Michigan counties, filed an application for an increase in rates June 4, six weeks after receiving approval for its first rate hike in 21 years.

In its application for a second rate increase. Detroit Edison said it has experienced "unprecedented increases" in cost of labor, fuel, interest rates and other exponses since 1988, which was the test year used as typil/ing the company's normal operations for the \$65 million rate increase approved by the PSC on April 22.

THE COMMISSION'S OR-THE COMMISSION'S OR-DER setting Sept. 15 as the date for the initial public hear-ing said State Attorney Gen-eral Frank J. Kelley filed a "notice of intervention" on July 20 in which he asked the PSC to direct Detroit Edison

The Public Service Commission of the Michigan Dept of Commerce will hold a public hearing Sept. 15 on the Detroit Edison Co.'s request for a \$28.5 million rate increase.

The Sept. 15 hearing, which is expected to last three days, will be held in the commission's offices in Lansing starting at 9:30 a.m.

PSC CHAIRMAN Willis F. Ward of Detroit said the commission hopes to reach a decision on Detroit Edison's application "as expeditiously as possible."

"The Commission has indicated that it believes this and other rate cases can be more expeditiously determined if certain procedural steps are taken prior to the rate hearing." Ward said.
"One of these is the holding of a prehearing conference at

"One of these is the holding of a prehearing conference at which time Detroit Edison will furnish copies of its proposed testimony, exhibits and other working papers and a schedule

of proposed rates and charges to accomplish the rate in-crease being sought."

crease being sought."

Ward said a prebaring conference was beld on Aug. 5. It was continued until Sept. 3 at which time Detroit Edison hopes to provide all of the information requested by the commission.

At the Aug. 5 prehearing, Ward said, the utility revealed that it was asking for a 323.5 million rate hike. Under procedures used in the past, Detroit Edison would not reveal this information until after it had presented its testimony seek.
