

# City Locates Homes, Persons Still Missing

The City of Farmington has located 3,205 missing homes for the city's estimated population of 9,851. City Manager John Dinan believes the city's actual population is closer to 11,000 and is convinced the Census Bureau made an error in its count.

Madison Heights believes the Census Bureau missed 2,140 persons in its city. Meanwhile, the Census Bureau has revised its count of Birmingham's population and reduced that city's count by 9,000.

**A BIG discrepancy appeared** between the city's estimate on the number of household units and the Census Bureau's.

The Census Bureau counted 2,912 household units in the city while the city, based on a survey of water users, believes it has 3,225 units.

Detroit Edison has informed the city that on April 1, 1970 (the day the census was conducted), it had 3,263 residential electrical users in the city.

The City DPW employed students during the summer and assigned them the job of finding missing persons, that is persons who live in the city on April 1, 1970, and were not counted by the Census Bureau.

The DPW counters also conducted a physical count of the actual number of household units in the city, including apartment vacancies as of April 1.

The physical recount showed a total of 3,205 household units, a discrepancy of 291.

The discrepancy leaves Dinan convinced the Census Bureau made a substantial error in computing the city's population.

**Offer Shots**

The immunization clinic scheduled for Aug. 23 will be held instead on Aug. 27 in the First United Methodist Church at 33112 Grand River, Farmington.

The RANGE of shots include all those immunizations required by the State of Michigan for a child to enroll in school, including the Rubella shot which offers protection against what is popularly known as German Measles.

The clinic, sponsored by the Oakland County Health Dept., will be open from 10 a.m. to noon on Thursday, Aug. 27.

This will be the last time the immunization clinic will be conducted in the county before school opens on Sept. 9.

**CHILDREN ENROLLING** in school for the first time are required by state law to present a statement signed by a physician that they have received all the necessary immunizations.

The school district urges those parents with kindergarten students who have not received all the shots necessary for enrollment to take advantage of the free shots at Thursday's clinic.
