Young persons will see how a play is staged, explore the sky at the university's planetarium, watch a horse show and view livestock judging.

Also Available will be tours of the capital, horticultural areas, entomology projects, a museum, the weather bureau, the MSU Veterinary Clinic and the General Motors Proving Grounds at Milford.

OVER 30 subject areas will offer activities for young persons attending any part of the four-day event, points out Wamhoff.

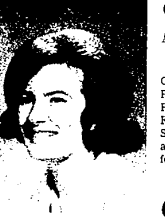
