State parks open free-of-charge

Come and enjoy a day at the beach, a family picnic or a hike on the trails at one of the 89 state park and recreation areas scattered throughout Michigan on June 2. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Parks Division is hosting a statewide "parks" open house that day. The public may enter state park and recreation areas without a motor vehicle permit in celebration of the open house.
A multitude of recreational activities for all ages are provided year-round, says DNR Parks Division Chief Jack Butterfield. Historic sites and exhibits and beautiful lakes for swimming, boating and fishing are just a sampling of the many offerings.

Outstanding Upper Peninsula scenic state park sites include the Tahquamenon Falls State Park. Here, says Butterfield, one can take a rowboat ride to the island at the lower falls, or follow winding trails to the impressive Upper Tahquamenon Falls. A raft ride over Michigan's largest springs also offers a thrill to those visiting Pictured Rocks State Park.
Additional U.P. sites include a ghost town in Fayette State Park, Fort Wilkins State Park and Porcupine Mountain State Park, Michigan's largest wilderness state park, not only offers impressive scenery and miles of trails, but interpretive shows and exhibits too.
In the lower peninsula, one can explore a logging camp that revives Michigan's white pine logging era at Hartwick Pines State Park or climb Lake Michigan sand dunes and learn

about them too at the Interpretive center at Hoffmaster State Park. A visit to the Living Farm at Maybury State Park or a close-up view of ships from all over the world at the St. Clair River at Algonac State Park also offer a unique outing for the family.
Canoe rides down the Huron River are available from the Proulx Lake Recreation area or one may sharpen range at Bald Mountain Recreation area, just another sample of the varied activities enjoyed at state park and recreation areas throughout Michigan.
State park and recreation areas are open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Park brochures may be obtained from DNR Information Services Center, P.O. Box 30028, Lansing 48909, 373-1220 and at all state park and recreation areas.

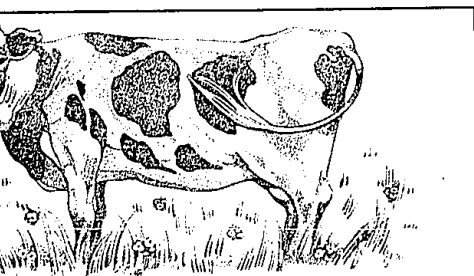
