• PARTICIPANTS NEEDED

Two Detroit hospitals are looking for participants for separate studies involving cardiac fitness and high blood pressure.

Sinai Hospital is looking for participants for a study being performed by the cardiac fitness and rehabilitation program. The study will evaluate the

interaction of a commonly prescribed type of cardiac medication, "beta-blockers," and exercise training on the two forms of blood cholesterol.

Participants must be males who have had coronary bypass surgery or coronary angioplasty, and do not have any major diseases of other organ systems. For more information, call Sue Hogan or David Wrisley at 493-4333.

Henry Ford Hospital's Fairlane Center is seeking patients with high blood pressure to participate in a study to test a new drug.

The study will evaluate the effectiveness of a new drug which may have fewer side effects than medications currently used to treat high blood pressure. The new drug is taken once every 24 hours, a major advantage over medication that now must be taken every three or four hours.

Patients must be between the ages of 16 and 65, have high blood pressure (above 140/90, but not exceeding 115 diastolic) and obtain approval from their physician. Those not eligible to participate include women of child-bearing age; patients who have recent heart attacks or strokes; patients with chronic renal or systemic diseases, such as lupus and anastomosis sufferers.

Opera star inducted

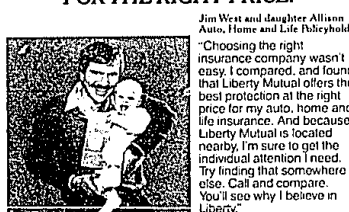

Pliska performed in the TV premiere of Verdi's "Simon Boccanegra" aired on PBS station 56.

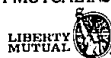
