

Opportunities for volunteers listed in guide

A new Volunteer Opportunities Guide for Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties is now available from United Community Services of Metropolitan Detroit (UCS), a Torch Drive agency. The guide is free and can be had by calling the UCS Volunteer Action Center at 833-0622.

More than 200 organizations are listed, from community centers and libraries to programs for the elderly and health promotion agencies, and they need volunteers of all ages. There are evening, weekend and weekday volunteer opportunities for almost everyone.

According to Ken Hollowell, chairman of the Volunteer Action Center

Committee, "We know that people do respond when they know they are needed and have a way of getting in contact. That's what the guide is all about."

The UCS Volunteer Action Center is the area's central clearinghouse for the promotion of volunteerism. Beyond publishing the guide, the center provides agencies with consultation and training in volunteer program management, works with companies to encourage employee-retiree volunteering, recognizes outstanding volunteers, and sponsors training in effective non-profit board membership.
