Class Size Remains Big Issue--Teachers

FARMINGTON

If the Farmington Education
Association's (FEA) 800 members strike this fall, inability
of the teachers and school district to agree on class size
may be a primary cause.

Talks between the FEA, the teachers' bargaining unit, and the district are deadlocked, even though an intermediary has been called in to help speed the process.

Roger Allen, executive director of the FEA, says Leonard Bennett from the Michigan Employment Relations Commission has been meeting with both sides.

"The primary issue still under contention is that of limitations on class size. It is the position of the association that enforceable class size language must be a part of any new agreement.

"At this point the board appears unwilling to temper its prerogatives in this area at all," Allen says.

The department chairmen structure is another issue which is yet to be received. Allen says the school beard's initial stance was one of chilaterally eliminating all department chairmen positions without negotiating with the FEA.

"Mr. Bennet has been suc-cessful in establishing that al-though changes may be made, they must come via the nego-tiating table," Allen adds.

Another issue, present in all negotiations, is economic.

"Farmington teachers will accept nothing but equality with neighboring districts of

this question." Allen says. "To date the board has failed to make any reasonable offer relative to salary or fringe benefits."
