Navy Petty Officer Third Class Mark Williams of Farmington Hills can verify that. He's one of 270 sallors serving aboard the San Diego-based frigate USS Bradley, a ship designed and equipped to perform a variety of tasks as part of the Pacific Fleet.

"Tm a sonar technician, and I use electronic equipment to listen for underwater contacts near the ship," said the 22-year-old son of John and Margartet Williams of Farmington Hills.

Williams and other sonar techniclans also service electronic equipment doperate computers.

"The challenges are keeping the equipment up," said Williams. "If we allow our gear to go down, then we've just defeated the ship's primary mission—anti-submarine warfare.

"The enjoyable thing about this occupation is moving up in rate," he said. "Everyone in my division works as a family. We help each other with work assignments, and we also spend some off time together.

"SHIPBOARD DUTY requires you to be dedicated to your job, staying on your toes," Williams added. "You aren't told exactly when you'll be in a port, so you need hobbles to occupy


When the Bradley is not deployed to the western Pacific or Indian Gecan, she and her crew frequently participate in readiness exercises off the Southern California coast.
