THE GENERATORS and transport-ers of hazardous waste materials musi-also share the responsibility of public and environmenial safety, said speaker James Harless, ERG Inc., Ann Arbor. Harless add federal law requires all large hazardous waste generators (1060 kilograms per month) to notify local governments about their operation, and to develop emergency response plans with police and fire department per-sonnel. "A vast majority of generators aren't even aware that they have to have a continuency plan," said Harless. He noted small generators (106 kilo-grams or more per month) will soon be included under the federal require-ment.

HE EMPHASIZED the importance of providing good training to local re-sponse teams to ensure against liability suits.



"As far as I know, this was the first program to address the iscue with mu-nicipalities across the state," said Bachman. "All municipalities need to learn what they should be concerned with in handling hazardous waste em-ergencies. The number of potential emergency situations will increase."
