Arevised plan has moved the project one step closer to completion. Plans were first prepared for the widening and improvement of Orchard Lake Road in the middle and late 1970S.

THE ORIGINAL PLAN, prepared by the Oakland County Road Commission, called for a continuous five lanes on Orchard Lake Road from Grand River north to 11 Mile Road.

north to 11 Mile Road. The cost of the project was estimat-ed at \$3.5 million, says Deadman. Be-cause the improvements did not move forward, the mayor of Farmington and members of the fillist 'city council met in May to re-evaluate the proposed im-provements.

In may be to encode the major problems with the jeroyements. "One of the major problems with the ideation of this roadway was right-of-way acquisition costs which could have exceeded one million dollars," Dead-man said in his report to the Farming-ton City Council.

The revised plan calls for: reducing the original five lane cross section to three lanes between 11 Mile and Ten Mile Roads, five lanes between 10 Mile and Fink Street, and a variation be-tween four and three lanes between Fink Street and Grand River. "We came up with what we think is a low-cost but effective proposal," Cos-tick said of the plan. The Oakhand County Road Commis-sion will present the resolution to the county's Urban Systems Teak Force for consideration of funding, as soon as federal monics become available for Oakhand County, said Deadman. "If it is approved, the tack force will assign it a priority - bopefully a blgb priority," Deadman said. The county road commission submits projects for federal monies according to their pri-ority. ority. The cost of the road improvements are "ahared," and are funded through federal, county and city monies, said Deadman.

Deadman. "It's difficult for the county to come up with money under current state leg-lalation which ilmits the amount of funding which can be used for improv-ing roads," Deadman said.

FUNDING THE \$2 million road im-provement project breaks down this way; 75 percent of the costs from fed-eral monies; 12.5 percent from the county; the balance of 12.5 percent from the communities of Farmington and Farmington Hills, according to Decaman.

Farming out mins, according to Deadman. Farmington Hills would fund a ma-jority of the 12.5 percent because of the long atretch of Orchard Lake Road run-ning through that community, said Deadman. Farmington Hills would fund 100 percent of the improvements costs for the stretch of Orchard Lake running from 11 Mile to 10 Mile Road. They would also fund 32 percent of the im-provements from 10 Mile to Grand

Child drowns in pool

Despite efforts by a Farmington Hills police officer, a 2-year-old Livo-nia child drowned late Tuesday after-noon in a swimming pool at a Farming-ton Hills home.

The child, Justin Welti, was found by his mother floating face down in a pool at the home of Diane and Bill Harwell, 25800 Ruiledge Crossing, where they were visiting.

Among the first to respond to the scene was Officer Michael Farley who administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

According to Police Chief William Dwyer, officers were called to that scene at about 5:23 p.m.

Dwyer said the child's mother, Terry Welti, 29, of Livonia told Farmington Hills officers that she had not seen Jus-tin for about 20 minutes.

SHE WENT to the second floor of the home to see if the child was playing there.

"She was unable to locate him," Dwyer said.

Terry Welti apparently looked out a window and saw the youngster floating in the pool.

"They ran outside with the home-owner. They did remove the victim from the pool."

The pool is an in-ground type in a fenced area, the police chief said.

Justin was taken to Botsford General Hospital.

Also responding to the scene were the fire department and Community EMS.
