Oakland County Connection, a new made-for-cable weekly TV program produced, staffed and distributed en-tirely by Oakland Community College (OCC) broadcasting students, will debut this month.

search on guests and topics, and oper-ated the state-of-the-art Orchard Ridge color studie.
