It's a year of change in the football programs at Detroit Country Day, Orchard Lake St. Mary's, Bloomfield Hills Cranbrook and Auburn Hills Avondale.

Cranbrook and St. Mary's each have new coaches. Joe D'Angelo is still the man in charge at DCD, and Rick Brewer still heads the staff at Avondale, but the Yel-low Jackets have dropped out of the Metro Conference and the Rhinos have filled the void. Both teams will compete as an independent this year as Avondale's membership will not take affect until the spring of 1986.
