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# Air-Harrison routs Farmington

Farmington's first mistake happened Friday, the day prior to its showdown football game with rival Farmington Harrison. A Falcon football player announced over the school's public address system

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A Faicon football player announced over the school's public address system that he and the rest of the squad would be after the bead of Harrisons all-state receiver Brian Smollarki. MACK COMPLETED 13 of 20 passes for 175 yards. He threw touchdown passes of 10 and 14 yards to tight end Rod Sarcevich and he ran for a pair of touchdowns — runs of six and seven

Mark Mecklenborg, Harrison's talected senior half back, defensive back and kleer, will be lost for the season with a knee injury.
