## Phone service spotlighted

AT&T Communications has kicked off a major marketing campaign for long-distance customers in Farmington Hills.

Business and residence phone customers in Farmington Hills will soon be asked by Michigan Bell Telephone Co. to designate their long-distance company, under the terms of the divestiture agreement. Affected will be customers whose phone numbers begin with the prefixes 553-661.

Customers who pick a preferred long-distance company will be connected to their choices when they dial "1" for long distance. Those customers who do not choose other companies will be connected to the AT&T long-distance network when they dial "1" to place calls.

AT&T operators will continue to

serve all customers who dial zero for help in an emergency, regardless of which long distance carrier the customer has selected for "dial 1" access. The operators also provide other assistance, such as granting immediate credit on AT&T calls that customers misdial.

DURING SEPTEMBER, Michigan Bell will send a letter to Farmington Hills customers explaining the selection process.

The company's "Reach Out America" program offers an hour of interstate calling nights and week-ends to anywhere in the United States for \$10 monthly. For an additional \$1.50 monthly callers can get a bonus option, a 15 percent discount on evening long-distance rates.

AT&T Opportunity Calling gives its customers a dollar credit for each dol-

lar of long distance calling up to a limit of \$300 each month. The credits can be applied toward the purchase of selected merchandise and services ranging from Caribbean cruises and personal computers to clothing and appliances.

The selection process is part of the court-ordered divestiture of the Bell System. Michigan Bell and other operating companies have been given until Sept. 1986 to convert equipment and software in their central offices so that any long distance company wishing to pay the extra cost can offer its customers "dial 1" long distance service as AT&T does.

Farmington Hills customers involved in the conversion who have not made arrangements with one of the companies by Nov. 21, will be randomly assigned one when "dial 1" access goes into effect on Dec. 21.
