

Churchill ices North at foul line

North Farmington girls basketball coach Greg Grodzicki, in stinging up the Livonia Churchill lineup, figured his best chance of winning Tuesday night would be to stop Amy Weber.

That his team did, holding the speedy Churchill guard to just eight points.

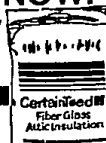
