3 Hills teens held on B&E charges

Three Farmington Hills teems face charges of breaking and entering, and two of the three are charged with felony fiteratm possession, in connection with the break-in of a West Hioomileid bouse Monday aftermon.

Madigan said the woman saw drawers open in the master bedroom and noticed the family room doorwall open. She saw three white males leaving a bedroom. All three ran past her,

and one turned and pointed a blue steel bandgun at her.

The woman yelled "Get out," and the three ran out of the house, through the three ran out of the house, through the year and into a nearby vacant field, Madigan said. The woman then called the West Bloomfield Police Department, which notified the nearby Farmington Hills Police Department. of the only burglar not yet apprehended. The auspect was in a driveway chatting with a man. The suspect apparently told the man he was out of gas.

Fox arrested Csokasy, according to the police report.


