

## Modulars Here?

of the Rap Line building because of type of construction involved until a complete study was made of modular buildings.

William Burke, commission chairman, observed the Rap Line center would be surrounded by school property and the valley on the west and there would be no intrusion on residential or any other land use.

"I don't know if type of construction is under the purview of the planning commission," Platt stated. "But, before we discuss this one particular modular building, we must discuss all modular buildings and I don't think we are prepared to do that now."

"I'd like to see a study made on modular construction," Platt added.

COMMISSIONER Don Stoddard said he had no problem with the [portable] for the bus drivers but did object to the Rap Line building.

Stoddard observed older children would be driving to the center and it should not be located near an elementary school. "Why locate it near a high school where the problem is?" asked Stoddard.

Platt objected that the board

of education must decide which site was best and the planning commission did not have the expertise to determine proper location.

Burke added he felt certain the board of education would not locate a building to be used for drug prevention without adequate planning.

ALLEN STRESSED he was not opposed to the Rap Line program but was against portable buildings.

"This is a portable building going into our community. Do you want it? And how will you stop the district next time if you say yes now?"

At this point, Platt predicted: "We'll see the time come when we can write an acceptable standard for modular buildings in the city."

He observed the quality of modular construction has improved immensely and repeated a study was in order. Platt added that study must be undertaken before he could support a permanent building permit for the two portables.

ALLEN MADE a motion, and received support from Stoddard, which stated: "The city is not in favor of portable buildings." But that motion was defeated with Platt, Burke, Dennis Pheneay and Richard Tupper voting no.

After the vote, Platt concluded: "I have not seen any facts to make me conclude that modular buildings are undesirable for the city."

The school district, under law, could locate both portables on any school site without a building permit.

Application was made out of courtesy but it is not expected the district will locate the portable if a permit is not issued. If a permit is issued, the portable classrooms will be located upon a permanent concrete foundation and connected to water and sewer service.

Although portable in nature, the buildings would become permanent and not temporary once lodged upon a foundation.

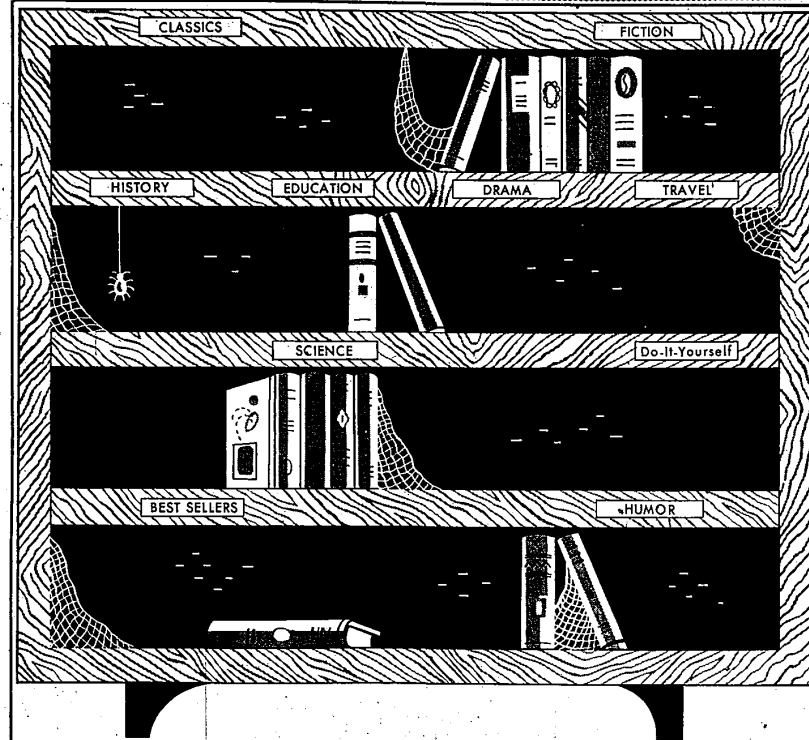
