

Baptist Churches Rabbi, Protestants Plan Lectures On Science

"There's a New World Coming" is the theme of a week-long series on scientific progress to be sponsored beginning Sunday, Sept. 13, by two area Baptist churches.

Dr. Emil Gaverluk, president of International Television Productions, Inc., will be the speaker. The First Baptist Church of Plymouth, on N. Territorial Road west of Gaylor, will be the scene of meetings at 7 p.m. Sunday and at 7:30 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 14 and 15.

THEN THE SERIES will move to the Grand River Baptist Church of Livonia, Six Mile west of Farmington Road, for sessions at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, Sept. 16 to 18.

Dr. Gaverluk, a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the National Association of Educational Broadcasters, will explain dramatic changes expected in the next few years in the field of science.

F'ton Student Gets Methodist Scholarship

Larry D. Leblang, who will be a junior at Albion College this fall, has been awarded a United Methodist Scholarship by the Board of Education of the United Methodist Church. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank I. Leblang of 2945 Pipers Lane, Farmington.

United Methodist Scholarship awards cover tuition and books up to \$500 and are granted on the basis of superior academic standing, leadership ability, active churchmanship, character, personality and financial need.

About 500 such awards are given annually by the Board of Education of the United Methodist Church and its national-wide scholarship program. More than 10,000 United Methodist Scholarships have been granted since the program was started in 1945.

Funds for the support of United Methodist Scholarships are received from local churches on the basis of a church-wide offering on United Methodist Student Day, the second Sunday in June.

Ice And Churches His Testimonials

Evangelist Larry Gannon finds many ways to let his God work in his life.

One is working to establish Protestant churches in France. Another is carving ice. Gannon, a missionary to France for 10 years and now completing a fourth in this country, plans to return soon with his wife, Ethel, to continue the missionary work.

THE ICE-CARVING he demonstrated last week in Calvary Baptist Church in Plymouth as he and Mrs. Gannon came near a month-long stay at the Missionary Internship in Farmington.

Gannon, a former hotel and resort chef who had become an alcoholic, said he feels the ice carving is part of God's plan to use his life for service. "He said it was in 1957, after even a boat with multiple sclerosis had failed to turn him from alcohol, that he first "gave testimony for the Lord."

"THE LORD saved me," he said. "I thought I was the looniest person in the world. But when I knew that God understood everything opened up."

It was several years after this Californian was converted and began to give testimony at evangelistic meetings that a teacher in a juvenile home in

Imperial, Calif., asked him to do some ice carving for her cooking class composed of boys interested in becoming chefs.

Gannon said he had never done any carving as a demonstration and "always before I would not allow anyone to come within a mile of me while I did my carving."

"But I prayed for special understanding from God," he added, "and the boys melted my heart."

AFTER THAT a "Youth for Christ" director in Phoenix, Ariz., engaged him to carve ice for a youth meeting, and the unusual demonstration became a success. Gannon, who carved an ice fruit basket in Calvary Church following his usual demonstration, said that each time he finishes the work he pulls from his pocket a whiskey bottle full of fruit coloring and pours it on the basket, at the same time time turning up lights behind the ice.

As the audience enjoys the effect, he explains that sometimes God takes things from the past to color the present. Christian life and "that is what he did to me — He has taken out of my past the ice carving and the whiskey bottle."
