



12 Mile Road undergoes widening

The widening of 12 Mile, between Orchard Lake and Farmington roads, is expected to be completed by mid-November. "We expect all the asphalt work to be done by Nov. 15, with the final cleanup and grading done in abe spring," said City Manager William Cocking.

The 33-million project includes widening the north side of 12 Mile to five lanes from east of Orchard Lake Road at Bramwell to west of Farmington Road at Peppermill.
When the project is completed, motorists will have two through lanes to travel in each direction for about two miles from Farmington to Mildhebelt roads, Contick said.

Gaps in existing sidewalks along the thoroughfare in this area will also be completed, said Tom Blasell, city public services di-

Another major improvement will be addition of a road that will provide access to both the Farmington Hills Post Office and the Farmington Community Library on the south side of 12 Mile.

"This will really eliminate the left turns (to the library and post office)," Costick said.

WIDENING PLANS began more than two years ago as a result
of concern and complaints from residents and city officials about
rowing traffic delays and congestion along 12 kille.

Through a cooperative renture between the city and the Cakiand County Road Commission, the federal government agreed to finance 75 percent of the project's cost if the remaining 25 percent was picked up by the city and county. "Normally, the city and county would share this amount," Costick said. "But the county didn't have the money."

As a result, city officials decided to foot the entire \$500,000 local hare, Costick said. Southfield's section of 12 Mile, between Telegraph and Northwestern Highway, is also being widened.
