A Farmington Hills woman was the first parent ticketed under the city's host liability ordinance. The ordinance, adopted by the city council in May at the urging of Fami-

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lies In Action's local chapter, penalizes adults age 17 or older who knowingly allow minors to consume alcoholic beverages or illegal adrugs at house parties under their control — and who fail to take corrective steps. py boople, Police Chief William Dwyer said. Violation of the ordinance is a mis-demeasor. Conviction carries a penalty of up to \$500 and \$0 days in the count jail for first offenders. Subsequent con-

victions bring a penalty of up to \$500 and 90 days imprisonment.

"SINCE THE ordinance was adopted June 10 and since we put out a special department order regarding policy, good discretion and common sense have been the guides," Dwyer said.

"And that's the case here. Officers responded to a call from a citizen, they did warn the person in charge of the party, and due to additional calls, went back to the scene and took proper action.

"The ordinance has been a very effective tool in dealing with these parties and as a deterrent," he added.

When officers tried to arrest Koriarz, bystanders intervened and the man fled into a nearby wooded area, according to police reports.

Monday, Koriarz was ticketed for assault and battery. Conviction of the misdemeanor carries a maximum pensage.

alty of 90 days in jail and a \$500 fine. SINCE THE ordinance went into effect in Jume, police have ticketed three residents — two 18-year-olds and one 17-year-old — in two separate incidents for allegedly violating the ordinance.

In both summertime incidents, parents of the young people were not ticketed even though the parties were on their property because they were out of town and unaware the parties were taking place, Dwyer said.

In September — prompted by a complaint from a Farmington Hills resident — the American Civil Liberties Union unveiled its intent to investigate the ordinance's constitutionality.

The driver of the car was wearing a seat belt. The names of all three juveniles were withheld by police while Investigation continues, Baginian said.

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
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
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
