O DEVIL'S NIGHT
Farmington and Farmington Hills reported few Devil's Night-related calls and none of a serious nature.

"We had extra patrol vehicles on the read, with our auxiliary officers complementing our sworn officers," Farmington Hills Police Chief William Dwyer said. "In fact, we had increased patrols all mock."

Increased visibility of marked patrol cars in the Hills was only one of the reasons for the few acts of Devil's Night vandailsm Wednesday, Dwyer said.

Parental awareness was the primary reason, he said. "Parents obviously are keeping a better eye on their children."

Extra patrols and marked cars also aided the cases in Farmington, but Department of Public Safety Director Frank Lauhoff stressed school co-persition, long. adolts in the community understand better their responsibilities," he added.

He also mentioned the Neighborhood Watch program, which has seen increased support since its inception two years ago.

Farmington also closed city parks early around the holiday as a deterrent, Lauhoff said.

The only maliclous-type calls reported Devil's Night or Halloween involved minor acts of vandafism, according to police.
