By now, you should have planted or will plant some additional bubs in your garden for a colorful display in 1986. Through the weeks, I have addised about planting spring the line in groups of the same kind for a maximum effect.

I have noticed that the form the same kind for a parameter of planting pletures all show the same method planting. However, I must add that grape psyacint, too, should be planted in groups of at least 12 bubs to attain a good color accent.

At this date, if you add ornamental trees or shurbs and fruit trees to your landscape pattern, be sure the weather is in a favorable cycle.

Leaves scattered from your property can turn out to be a good friend to a knowledgeable gardener. If you pread them over tender planting too soon, they can turn out to be a liability, Rodents will think you are a "nice guy"

It is important to realize that leaves left on a lawn for over a small period can really damage the grass you have nursed along all summer.

MANY OF our readers have joined the cult of wildflower enthusiasts. Lately I have been hearing about the pleasure of potting up wildflowers in

very early spring for use as accents in planter boxes on an apartment balcony or in flower pots on a patio.

Many of you have been bringing geranioms from your gardens in for the winter. Remember these flowering plants want to be pot bound; don't plant a small geranium in a large pot. They like lots of sun. Water them every four days, allowing the soil to dry out before watering again. If you take cuttings of

geraniums in late Jonuary, they will blossom in the summer for you, providing an extra dividend for your garden. Don't forget to pinch the terminal ends of you geranium plants to provide a stocky shape. Another tip is to keep turning them and give them fertilizer when they are in bud.

Salt injury in plants of all sizes and trees can only be dotected when the injury actually begins to show.

The following trees have low tolerance for salt: red maple, sugar maple, dogwood, burning bush, black walnut, privot, Norway spruce, white Iir and hemlock.

We do have trees which have a high tolerance to salt: birch trees, Norway maple, hopey locust, white oak, all kinds of poplars, Iarch species, Australian pine, honeyauckle, Alpine currant, spirea vanhoutel.
