Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police and fire calls received during the past week:

• DISTURBANCE QUELLED

Six young people were ticketed under city ordinance following a disorderly disturbance outside Tully Hall, 31005 Orchard Lake, Saturday night.

According to a Farmington Hills police report, about 200 young people were gathered in front of Tully Hall when police arrived shortly past 10 p.m. After several fights broke out, officers directed the crowd to disperse.

Within five minutes, most of the young people heard at they again were ordered to leave and didn't. Five young men ages 17-20 were ticketed for obstructing free and uninterrupted passage of the public. A 17-year-old woman also was ticketed for fighting.

• NEWSBOX TORCHED

A newspaper box in front of a house on Oak Forest was deliberately set afire about 1:30 a.m. Sunday, Farmington Hills fire officials report.

The box was attached to a mailbox. Tips should be called to the fire department: 553-0740.

• WINDOW SMASHED

A large rock was thrown through the front window at Super Gap, 30835 Orchard Lake, sometime Nov. 7-8, according to a Farmington Hills police report. Damage was estimated at \$200.

• CAR RECOVERED

A 1985 Camaro 2+2 stolen from a Farmington pizzeria parking lot Saturday was recovered — undamaged — early Tuesday by the Detroit Police Department, according to a Farmington report.

The \$18,000 car is owned by a Farmington Hills man who works at Romano's Pizzeria, 30950 Grand River, where the theft occurred. A suspect was apprehended by Detroit Police.

• TEENS TICKETED

Two Farmington Hills teen-agers were ticketed under city ordinance for possession of alcoholic beverages.

The youths — ages 19 and 17 — were found in possession of several open beer cans in the parking lot at Putt 'n Games, 30749 Grand River, Saturday night, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

• WEAPONS SEIZED

Two 18-year-old men were arrested in Farmington early Tuesday for al-

legedly carrying concealed weapons and allegedly violating the controlled substance act.

One loaded BB repeater with a sawed-off handle and an unloaded BB air pistol were confiscated. Also confiscated were suspected marijuana and paraphernalia, and five suspected valium tablets, according to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report.

Before the arrests, an officer saw the Livonia and Detroit residents sitting in a running vehicle in the south lot of the Orchard/10 Shopping Center. The men were released, pending issuance of warrants.

• RASH OF BREAK-INS

Cash totaling \$970 and merchandise valued at \$4,370 were stolen sometime Nov. 11-12 during break-ins at seven Orchard Lake Road businesses, according to Farmington Hills police reports. Two other break-ins were attempted but to no avail.

The largest loss was reported by Antonio Salon, where a video recorder and camera, a color television, a telephone, special scissors and a microwave oven — together valued at \$5,320 — were taken.

Other thefts were reported by Schroeder's Flowers, Conrad's Sausage, Hair Performances, Sir Speedy Printing Center, Tosa A Party and Business.

Police have not determined if the incidents are related.

• THEFTS REPORTED

Two hundred watches valued at \$40,000 were stolen during a break-in at the Artisan's Jewelry, 35480 Grand

River, sometime Nov. 9-10, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

About \$1,000 worth of women's wear was stolen during a break-in at the Designer Depot, 32606 Middlebelt, sometime Nov. 10, according to a Farmington Hills police report. Items included four suits, nine imitation furs, one wool coat and five raincoats. The suits were recovered from the sidewalk near the front window.

A dishwasher valued at \$350 was stolen from a house under construction on Holsworth sometime Nov. 8-9, according to a Farmington Hills police

report. Eurocraft Homes reported the theft.

Eleven fur coats and leather belts valued at \$13,517 were stolen early Monday from a storage room at Steve Butcher Furs, 31703 Grand River, according to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report. Among the furs stolen were three minks valued at \$1,495 to \$2,350 each.

Eight pine shrubs valued at \$160 were stolen from the Pepper Square construction site, 39225 Grand River, sometime Nov. 7-8, according to a Farmington Hills police report.

Assault suspects nears trial

A 17-year-old Livonia man is scheduled to stand trial for allegedly shooting a security guard at a Farmington Hills miniature golf course.

After a 2½-hour preliminary examination Tuesday, District Judge Michael Hand bound over for trial Paul A. Dober on charges of assault with intent to commit murder and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Hand continued bond at \$10,000, 10 percent of which was posted to gain release.

Conviction of the assault charge carries a maximum penalty of life in prison. Conviction of the firearms possession charge is punishable upon conviction by a mandatory two-year prison term.

Farmington Hills Police have petitioned Oakland County Probate Court to waive jurisdiction so that a 16-year-old may be charged as an adult with the same felony.

The security guard, Terrence E. Met-

zier, 25, of Detroit is reported back in the hospital. He initially sustained gunshot wounds to both forearms and to the abdomen, Police Sgt. Charles Nebus said.

Police seized the suspected weapon during a search of the defendant's home, Police Chief William Dwyer said.

The shooting occurred at 9:10 p.m. Sept. 3 at Putt 'n Games, 30749 Grand River.
